

Table 2- Typological World-views

Ethereal World-view

- Composite of Thinking and Intuition as Superior and first Auxiliary Function & vice verse
- Psyche is experienced as synonymous with the mind, & limitless possibilities
- Psyche derives its reality from images, ideas, principles, theories
- Perceived by others as verbal, brilliant, imaginative, playful, or detached, nutty, impractical, visionary
- Examples: Carl Jung, Einstein, John Kennedy

Oceanic World-view

- Composite of Feeling and Intuition as Superior and first Auxiliary Function & vice verse
- Experience life as seamless whole: get personally involved
- Perceived by others as receptive, flexible, non-judgmental, romantic, mystical, inspiring, helpless, moody, unpredictable,
- Create confusion by disrupting existing order
- Examples: Gandhi, Churchill, Queen Victoria

Structural World-view

- Composite of Thinking and Sensate as Superior and first Auxiliary Function
- experience a sharp split between the subjective and objective reality
- Consciousness remains objectified while subjective self remains unconscious
- They make structures: maps, blueprints, philosophical systems, administrative plans, political ideologies, or psychological theories.
- Orderly, capable, skillful, dependable or
- dry, lifeless, rigid, domineering, tyrannical
- e.g. Sigmund Freud, Florence Nightingale

Experial World-view

- Composite of Feeling and Sensate as Superior and first Auxiliary Function & vice verse
- Reality is concrete, direct, personal, have difficulty in detaching from environment, have here and now orientation
- Ideal culture bearers, provide social glue, play a vital role in public affairs, and interested in ideas that can be built from experiences
- Perceived by others as socially adept, warm & sensitive in relationships, practical dependable, moral: also conventional, unimaginative, stubborn
- e.g. Eleanor Roosevelt, Sam Erwin
