Saturday, January 17, 2015 **Ethics and Boundaries of Documentation** David Mays, MD

Documentation is a long-neglected but crucially important aspect of mental health practice. Rather than reducing risk exposure, the electronic health record is exposing clinicians to greater privacy and boundary concerns. Internet and social media pressures are also changing the landscape of mental health care. This workshop will provide training on how and why to document, how to think about confidentiality in the medical health record, how to document risk assessments, and how the use of searches, e-mail, and social media are all changing our understanding of therapeutic boundaries.

- 2. Examine formats and important aspects of intake notes and
- 3. Compile the requirements for doing risk assessments for suicidality and violence
- 4. Describe how boundaries are changing between therapists and clients under the influence of the Internet.

Resilience: Analytical, Neuroscience and **Spiritual Perspectives** Ashok Bedi. MD

Resilience refers to a class of phenomena characterized by good outcomes in spite of serious threats to adaptation or development. Between the shores of illness and wellness lies the flow of the healing zone. This Neuroplastic zone has transformative properties for our mind, body and relationships. Carl Jung calls this the Psychoid; neuroscientists call this our Triune Brain. Contemporary neuroscientists have explored these mysterious zones in contemplative and meditative states. Jung proposed the concepts of the Psychoid Space and the transcendent function as the forerunners of the emerging neuroscience of the Neuroplastic Healing Zone that foster resilience. The converging findings from variable-focused and person-focused investigations of resilience focus on ego adaptation. Analytical Psychology focuses on transformation that springs from the Soul in the face of adversity. We will explore in a preliminary manner Jung's resilience as depicted in the Red Book. The presentation will start with a Resilience Assessment Test offered to participants. Experiential contemplative practices that foster resilience will be demonstrated, with an opportunity for participants to experience these practices

- Summarize the converging findings from variable-focused and personfocused investigations of resilience.
- 2. Examine the neuroscientific research on resilience from many different perspectives, particularly in trauma research.
- 3. Discuss the Jungian Analytical perspective on resilience
- 4. Utilize the concept of the Transcendent Function to harvest the transformative potential of crisis, trauma and the activation of the Resilience Response.
- 5. Practice contemplative techniques that enhance resilience.

Friday, April 10, 2015 **Science for Mental Health Professionals** David Mays, MD

Keeping up to date about the latest science behind brain imaging, brain stimulation, neurochemistry, and genetics is a challenge for even the most obsessive - compulsive mental health professional. Let Dr. Mays do the work for you. This day-long workshop will describe and explain some of the latest findings in basic and applied science that are driving our research and leading to new treatments of the major mental disorders.

We will explore brain anatomy and function as revealed by functional MRI scans. Current brain stimulation techniques will be described, including transmagnetic stimulation and deep brain stimulation.

We will consider current views of neurons and microglia in the brain and their contributing role to the development of mental illness. We will look at genetics and the explosive field of epigenetics and how the behavior of our future grandchildren may be influenced by our lifestyle decisions today. We will also see how genetic markers are providing clues for the etiology of our most puzzling disorders and hope for innovative treatments.

No biochemistry degree is needed - only an interest in the science behind the human mind and a willingness to put aside your old preconceptions of how the world works.

Objectives

- 1. Describe a few fundamentals of neuroanatomy relevant for mental health practitioners.
- 2. Recognize the limitations of imaging the brain, particularly fMRI.
- 3. Be introduced to new technologies in deep brain stimulation and genetic manipulation.

Emotional Incest in Group Psychotherapy -**Conspiracy of Silence** Robert S. Pepper, MD

Participants will learn that abuses of power can occur when the boundary is blurred between therapy and not therapy in group treatment. Alterations of the frame always have consequences. Many clinicians take the frame of treatment for granted. In this case, the frame of treatment refers to the nature of the relationship between leaders and members and the nature of the relationship between the members themselves. This presentation assumes that the frame of treatment is a variable and that the manner in which group members know the leader and what they know, and the manner in which they know each other and what they know, all have a profound effect on the course and outcome of the treatment. Participants will also learn that there are at least eight possible dangers of blurred boundaries in treatment that can produce iatrogenic treatment reactions:

- 1. Breaches of confidentiality 2. Looping
- 3. The double bind 4. The pass along effect,
- or dumping 5. Gaslighting 6. Over-stimulation
- 7. The "Emperor's New Clothes" effect
- 8. Scapegoating.

- Discern the differences between boundary crossings and boundary violations in group psychotherapy
- 2. Identify the eight potential dangers of blurred boundaries in group psychotherapy
- 3. Analyze the symptoms of iatrogenic treatment reactions produced by blurred boundaries in group therapy.
- 4. Apply techniques to resolve resistances when working with difficult groups.
- 5. Understand the countertransference resistances to the effective utilization of induced aggressive feelings in group treatment

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Ashok Bedi, MD, is a Jungian psychoanalyst and a board certified psychiatrist. He is a member of the Royal College of Psychiatrists of Great Britain, a diplomat in Psychological Medicine at the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of England, and a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. He is a Clinical Professor in Psychiatry at the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee and a training analyst at the Carl G. Jung Institute of Chicago. He is in private practice in Milwaukee and is the author of several books which may be previewed at his website www.pathtothesoul.com. Crossing the Healing Zone is Dr. Bedi's fourth book, following Awaken the Slumbering Goddess: The Latent Code of the Hindu Goddess Archetypes (BookSurge, 2007), Retire Your Family Karma: Decode Your Family Pattern and Find Your Soul Path (Nicolas-Hays, Inc., 2003), and Path to the Soul (Samuel Weiser, Inc., 2000). He is the liaison for the IAAP for developing Jungian training programs in India and travels annually to India to teach, train and consult with the Jungian Developing groups at several centers in India including Ahmedabad and Mumbai. He leads the annual "A Jungian Encounter with the Soul of India" study group at several centers in India under the auspices of the New York Jung Foundation.

David Mays, MD, PhD, is a licensed physician in the state of Wisconsin. He is Board Certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and has additional qualifications in Forensic Psychiatry. He is a Clinical Adjunct Assistant Professor on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin. Madison, with a dual appointment as faculty in the Department of Professional Development and Applied Studies. He is a Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, member the Wisconsin Psychiatric Association, and a member of the American Academy of Psychiatry and the Law. Over the last 23 years, Dr. Mays has practiced psychiatry in a variety of settings, including an HMO, an assertive community treatment program, private clinical and forensic practice, and as the clinical director of the forensic program at the Mendota Mental Health Institute. This program is a 180-bed program with the only maximum security forensic unit in the state of Wisconsin. Dr. Mays was the treating psychiatrist on the most restrictive unit in maximum security, housing some of the most significantly impaired psychiatric patients in the state.

Dr. Mays has received numerous awards for his teaching and clinical work, including the Distinguished Service Award from the

Alliance for the Mentally III in Dane County, the Exemplary Psychiatrist Award from the National Alliance of the Mentally III. the Exceptional Performance Award from the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services, the 2006 Outstanding Professional Award from the Wisconsin Association on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse, and the 2010 Outstanding Mental Health Professional Award from the Wisconsin National Alliance on Mental Illness. He is a highly sought after presenter on numerous topics in mental health, including psychiatric diagnosis and treatment, personality disorders, suicide and aggression risk management, mainstream and alternative treatments in psychiatry, and the biology of ethics.

Robert S. Pepper, MD, is the Director of Education and Training at the Long Island Institute for Mental Health in Rego Park, New York, Adjunct Professor of Behavioral Science at the New York Institute of Technology in New York City and is in private practice in Forest Hills, New York. Rowman & Littlefield has just published Dr. Pepper's book: "Emotional Incest in Group Psychotherapy--A Conspiracy of Silence"; he is also the author of numerous articles on the subject of ethics and boundaries in individual and group psychotherapy.


